

BBC Radio Oxford Oxfordshire Young Sport Reporter 2016 Competition

Terms and Conditions

1. The competition is open to all residents of the UK living in Oxfordshire or attending school in Oxfordshire in school years 7-13 at 28 February 2016, except the children of BBC employees, and children of anyone connected with the competition. Parental consent to enter will be required. Proof of age, identity and eligibility may be required. Consent from winner's school/Oxfordshire County Council will be sought by the BBC for the winner to be absent from school where necessary.
2. The competition will open at 00:01 on Monday 1 February 2016 and close at 22.00 on Sunday 28 February 2016. Entries received outside of the period will not count.
3. Entrants need to create an audio piece consisting of a sports report or commentary of no more than 60 seconds in length and send it with a completed entry form directly to the following BBC address to complete the entry:

Audio clips should be submitted as .mp3, .wav, .wma, .aiff or .m4a format and be no larger than 8MB. In the event that clips are longer than 60 seconds, only the first 60 seconds will be judged and the rest will be discounted.

No other method of entry will be accepted. Only one entry is allowed per entrant (the first, any subsequent entries will be disregarded). Only individual entries shall be accepted, no groups, teams or class entries will be accepted.

4. Entries will be judged in two categories – years 7-10 and years 11-13. The entries will be viewed and by a panel of senior editorial BBC staff and will be judged on creativity, use of language, knowledge of subject matter and skill in communicating this knowledge. The judges will decide on 4 winners in each category.
5. Entrants must be available via the contact information they have provided. If, after reasonable attempts a winner cannot be contacted, that entrant's participation in the competition ends. If the chosen winner cannot take up the prize as stated, then the Prize will be offered to the next best finalist and they shall be deemed the winner.
6. The Prize consists of a day of training at BBC Oxford with BBC sport reporters and the chance to assist in the coverage of the Oxfordshire School Games 2016 to be broadcast on BBC Radio Oxford (details and exact dates to be confirmed). Winners will be required to be available for the training day at BBC Oxford on Tuesday 29th March 2016. Winners and a parent/guardian will also be required to be available to attend the Oxfordshire School Games on 13th and 14th April and 7th and 8th July 2016 (each winner will attend one pair of days only, chosen by

BBC Radio Oxford). For the avoidance of doubt, the prize does not include accommodation, transport costs or any other expenses.

7. The prize is stated as above. There is no cash alternative and the prize cannot be sold or transferred in any circumstances.
8. The BBC's decision as to entrants taking part and winners is final. No correspondence relating to the competition will be entered into.
9. Entrants agree to take part in any post-competition publicity if required. The winner will be notified by 4 March 2016.
10. Your email address, name, age and any other personal details will be handled by the BBC in accordance with the Data Protection Act 1998. The BBC will only ever use your personal details for the purposes of administering this competition. Your personal details will only be kept for as long as necessary to fulfil these purposes. 11. All entries must be the original work of the entrant and must not infringe the rights of any other party (including, but not limited to, the rights in any music included). If any other person is captured in the recording it is the entrant's responsibility to ensure they have all the necessary consents, including any consent that may be required for a parent or guardian. The BBC accepts no liability if entrants ignore these rules and entrants agree to fully indemnify the BBC against any claims by any third party arising from any breach of these rules.
12. All entries must not contain illegal, unlawful, defamatory, obscene, offensive or any other unsuitable material. Entrants and finalists must not put themselves in danger at any stage of this competition. All entries must be suitable to be broadcast by the BBC. Entrants must not put themselves or others in danger in the making of the audio entry.
13. Entrants retain the copyright in their original work but grant to the BBC a perpetual non-exclusive royalty-free licence to broadcast their entry across all media, as well as use it on any online platforms. For the avoidance of doubt, no fees or expenses will be paid for the creation of any part of the entry.
14. Entrants permit the BBC to edit or change entries in any way it may, in its sole discretion, consider necessary for the purposes of use in the competition.

16. The BBC reserves the right to: (i) amend these terms and conditions and vary the competition rules including but not limited to the opening and closing times; (ii) disqualify any entrant who breaches the rules, displays rude, insulting or inappropriate behaviour at any point (including prize fulfilment) or has acted

fraudulently in any way and; (iii) cancel the competition, at any stage, if in its opinion it is deemed necessary or if circumstances arise outside its control.

The BBC, their sub-contractors, subsidiaries and/or agencies cannot accept any responsibility whatsoever for any technical failure or malfunction or any other problem with any server, system, network or mobile operator or service provider or otherwise which may result in any registration not being properly logged or not recorded.
18. Entrants will be deemed to have accepted these rules and to agree to be bound by them when registering.
19. The competition is run by the BBC. The applicable law is that of England and Wales.
