### Part 1 conversation:

- VICKI:** Thanks. Hey this is a fantastic flat.
- CALLUM:** Thanks. Let me **hang your coat up**.
- VICKI:** OK, here, I'll put my scarf on the same hook too.
- CALLUM:** OK. Well, I'll **show you around**.
- VICKI:** Yes, let's have look at the other rooms.
- CALLUM:** Right. This way...This is the living room...

### Part 1 examples:

1. To move in. When we moved into our new offices everything was in boxes for weeks.
2. To come round. Do you fancy coming round to my place for dinner tonight?
3. To hang something up. When I stay in a hotel, I like to hang my clothes up, not leave them in my suitcase.
4. To show someone round. My friend's never been to London before, so I'm looking forward to showing her around.
